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religious values require nurses in Pakistan to navigate social media platforms with cultural competence and respect⁴.

Pakistan's healthcare system and nursing profession face various societal and organizational constraints that impact nurses' use of social media. Factors such as limited resources, hierarchical structures, and traditional communication channels can hinder nurses' engagement on social media platforms. Overcoming these barriers requires advocacy for digital health literacy, supportive organizational policies, and capacity-building initiatives⁵.
